

NCS GOLD AWARD

We are delighted to announce that the National Citizen Service has awarded us with Gold status because so many of our students signed up. As well as a plaque, we received a certificate from the Prime Minister.

The National Citizen Service is open to all 16 and 17-year-olds in England. It helps young people build skills for work and life, while they take on new challenges and meet new friends. They have a short time away from home and take part in a team project that will help their community.

ARE YOU SMARTER THAN A 12 YEAR OLD?

Five pupils are celebrating achieving 'genius level' results in MENSA's world-renowned IQ test.

Two of these pupils exceeded the 160 IQ that Albert Einstein and Professor Stephen Hawking were said to have possessed. A. Singh Basra and A. Bhupla achieved an incredible 'perfect score' of 162.

K. Marwaha, K. Ord and K. Tobias each possess IQs of 152 putting them in the top 2% of the population.

Each pupil was delighted by their result.

A. Bhupla "My parents were very proud and I received video messages from family across the country."

A. Singh Basra "I was speechless. My parents kept saying 'wow' and treated me to a family meal."

K. Ord "My Mum has shared the news far and wide. It has inspired my family to try the test too."

K. Tobias "I'm so proud of myself for concentrating hard and focusing. I was treated to a lovely meal out with my family."

K. Marwaha "My parents always advise me that you can do anything that you put your mind to if you work hard."

We use the MENSA test because we are passionate about uncovering potential and nurturing it. We are delighted that these pupils have been recognised by MENSA as being in the top 2% of the whole country. Statistically, of course, not everyone can be a 'genius'. But knowing they have a high IQ will encourage these pupils to push themselves



ORCHESTRAL EXPERIENCE



A group of pupils experienced a live orchestral performance by the world-renowned City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra (CBSO) at Symphony Hall in Birmingham.

After opening with a thunderous rendition of Alan Silvestri's theme from The Avengers films, the orchestra played pieces by Prokofiev, Tchaikovsky, Pärt and more. This is what some of the pupils said:

Sami: "I liked the heavenly sounding one. The piece Tchaikovsky wrote for a bet with his friend."

Mercedes: "I really liked it but I'm not sure why. It was a new experience."

Nicole: "It was really interesting watching them and seeing how they played their instruments."



HOLOCAUST SURVIVOR SKYPE CONFERENCE

This year marks 75 years since the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the infamous Nazi death camp. To mark the occasion, we had a Skype conference with someone who survived the camp.

The story as told by holocaust survivor, Susan Pollack was eye-opening. Selected Year 11 and Year 12 students heard the true horrors of her experience and had the opportunity to empathise with her story. The fact that she went on to live a happy life and even returned to the camps after experiencing the traumas of Auschwitz-Birkenau and Bergen-Belsen, now being 90 years old, demonstrates the personal importance to Susan to be able to share her knowledge, which is key to improving society both today and in the past.

Her story:

Susan wasn't even 15 years old when she transported by cattle bus for 5-6 days with no food or water to her first camp. She spent 10 weeks in Auschwitz and then went on to spend the majority of the Holocaust in the horror that was Bergen-Belsen and it was there that Susan's brother and herself, although separately, survived until the British troops liberated the camps in 1945.

Susan spoke of the inhumanity that spread among the camps. Students who witnessed the webcast have said it was very interesting to hear about what happened only 75 years ago during the Second World War. This has not only broadened the perspectives of pupils who listened to her story, but also inspired us to advocate for equality within our society.

LANGUAGES MENTOR PROGRAMME

The MFL department have taken up a very exciting opportunity to work with the University of Cardiff and the University of Warwick in a programme focusing on changing attitudes to language learning.

The programme, Languages Horizons, involves all pupils in Year 8 taking a short online questionnaire to share their views and opinions about studying a language. Pupils completed these questionnaires a couple of weeks ago in their MFL lessons and now staff here at Barr Beacon School and at the University are working together to select a cohort of 24 Barr Beacon pupils who will be mentored by two undergraduates from the University of Warwick.

The students that our Barr Beacon pupils will be working with are all ambassadors for language learning, either having a language to A level or are currently studying a language as part of their degree. The undergraduates will run sessions here at Barr Beacon School focusing on the cultural and social aspects of learning a language with the hope of showing our pupils the doors that language learning can unlock outside of the classroom.

We are thrilled to be involved in the project and can't wait to get started. Look out for more updates next half term!


"It was the first time I've been to a Panto, it was so funny and exciting. I can't understand how one dwarf can still be grumpy and another sleepy!"

Stonewall Riots

After years of the police raiding their favourite bar, the LGBTQ+ community of New York finally had enough and fought back. Their actions sparked a movement that reshaped the lives of generations to come.

Sometimes the heroic activists are presented mostly as gay white men at the expense of lesbians, ethnic minorities and transgender people.

Historians now credit the significant contributions of (amongst others) black drag queen Marsha P. Johnson, black lesbian Storme DeLaverie and transgender Latina American Sylvia Rivera.



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


