#### **Statement of intent**

Our Pupil Premium Strategy and Recovery Premium strategy focus on providing bespoke support for Pupil Premium pupils to ensure there are no barriers to success.

A) Attainment - support to ensure success in accessing the curriculum

*C)* Aspirations – support to ensure that Pupil Premium pupils have experiences that inform them fully about future careers, education and training possibilities.

*D)* Self Esteem – support to ensure that there are no barriers to Pupil Premium pupils attending school on time, fully supported and with their needs met, so that they can have success in accessing the curriculum and have pride in themselves.
